#### Voting Procedures

On the Night of the Board of Directors Election:

Doors will open at 6:30

Members eligible to vote will sign next to their name on an alphabetical list available at corresponding tables. Their hand will be stamped. These members will receive a paper ballet.

Other members and attendees will sign in at the appropriate tables.

The meeting will begin at 7 p.m. and each candidate will be allowed 30 seconds to address the membership.

The election will begin at 7:15.

The closed ballot box will be centrally located in the room and will be monitored by an independent,  $3^{rd}$  party individual.

Elections will continue until 7:45 or until all who wish to vote have done so.

Ballots will be counted in a secured area with the oversight of the  $3^{rd}$  party individual.

Results will be announced before the close of the meeting.

VOTER ELIGIBILITY: A member shall be entitled to one vote, provided s/he is present at the meeting, has attended at least one other meeting within the current fiscal year (June 1 - May 31), is a member listed in the membership list on the recorded date and is not in default of payment of dues. An organizational member is also entitled to one vote provided a delegate has been registered with the Council and had attended at least one other meeting within the current fiscal year. It is possible for one person to vote once as a residential member and once as a delegate for an organizational member. No delegate can vote for more than one co-operating organization

No single person in our community can speak for everyone. Our leadership should reflect the neighborhood and represent our varied interests. These candidates do.




Our bylaws speak to a need for diversity. This board would fulfill their spirit and intent.

PCRG reviews loan documents, interrupts loan terms and offers recommendations free of charge. They may be able to save you thousands of dollars in interest and legal fees. A staff of experts is available to meet you where you feel most comfortable and offer thoughtful, sound advice. Their primary concern is helping you through a very stressful situation.
