Now Recycle More Curbside, Mayor Ravenstahl outlines...

Beginning January 1, recycling crews will be collecting additional recyclable items at the curb in the Central and Eastern divisions only. In addition to your regular curbside recycling items (bottles, cans and newspaper), residents in the Central and Eastern divisions may now also recycle the following items at the curb on your recycling collection day:


- Magazines, catalogs, paperboard, junk mail, mixed paper, phonebooks and office paper (all colors) at the curb.
- Corrugated cardboard (must be broken down, flattened and tied). Pizza boxes must be clean and empty (that is, free of food and wax paper).













Here's the best part: You do not have to put recyclable items in separate bags. All recyclables can be mixed together in the same blue plastic bag. Remember to always place recyclables away from regular garbage on collection day. Also, please

discard all caps and lids from bottles and please do not add any other materials to the list above, otherwise they will contaminate the recycling. Do not place Styrofoam out for recycling, dispose of it in your regular garbage.

What's the catch? The City has a recycling contract for single stream recycling that allows the recyclables to be mixed together. Once the recycling is collected, it is then separated at the single-stream recycling plant using modern technologies and marketed as individual commodities. We hope this will make recycling easier and more convenient for you, as well as double our recycling tonnages, increase revenue for the City and significantly reduce our landfill disposal cost.

We piloted this program in November and December 2007 and will eventually phase it into the entire City.

Recycle Your Christmas Tree Curbside

Recycling crews will collect your Christmas trees for recycling *on your recycling collection day in January 2008*. All Christmas trees must be free of all decorations, tinsel and plastic in order to be collected for recycling.


Christmas trees must be removed from plastic bags if set on the curb for recycling. Plastics are contaminants to the composting process. Trees that do not meet these requirements will be taken as bulk refuse.

City residents may also take Christmas trees to the Public Works drop-off centers (East End, Hazelwood, and West End) and to the Environmental Services main building at 3001 Railroad Street (Strip District) throughout January.

A Blue-Star Recycling Neighborhood

Is your neighborhood a Blue-Star Recycling Neighborhood? Mayor Ravenstahl encourages all residents to help their neighborhood become a Blue-Star Recycling Neighborhood (an innovative City program). Every year the City conducts a unique, curbside recycling setout survey to evaluate residential recycling participation. For 2007, the City had 13 Blue-Star Neighborhoods and 30 Green-Star Neighborhoods. Since the measurement is based on setout rather than quantity, it does not encourage consumption but rather encourages participation. So, if everyone participates, all neighborhoods would be Blue-Star Neighborhoods.



Neighborhood Recycling Participation Rating

Gold Star - above 95% recycling setout participation

Blue Star - above the City's current recycling participation goal of 65%

Green Star-more than 50% recycling participation but below the City's current recycling participation goal

Brown Circle - above 35% recycling participation but below 50% participation.

Red Circle - below 35% recycling participation (35% is equivalent to the State's waste diversion goal).

Five points to turning your neighborhood circle in to a star.

1. Neighbor influence/neighbor awareness.

Encourage your neighbor on either side of you to recycle. Tell them that the City wants everyone to recycle and will cite non-recyclers.

2. Place material in blue bags.

Set material out in the correct bags, otherwise the trash crews may mistake it for garbage and dispose of it, instead of recycling.

3. Separate blue bags and other recyclables from garbage at the curb.

If your trash covers your recycling it is difficult for the crews to notice especially in the early morning, and this can lead to missed pickups.

4. Always set out recycling on time before 6 a.m. on your day of collection.

Late setouts reduce efficiency because someone has to come back and service your residence or you may have to keep your trash and recycling for another week.

5. Neighborhood recycling enforcement.

The city enforces all recycling guidelines. Warnings are issued but perpetual non-recyclers will be cited.

Got a business? Then get recycling!

Begining January 2008, the City will increase enforcement of business recycling regulations. All commercial establishments, charitable or nonprofit institutions and institutional establishments must provide a program for the separation and recycling of high grade office paper, corrugated cardboard, plastic containers (1-5), aluminum cans and leaf or yard waste, where applicable (City of Pittsburgh Code 619). The City will distribute business compliance forms to all businesses in the first quarter of 2008 and will follow-up with warnings and citations for non-compliant businesses. Recycle and save on your disposal costs. Also, for every ton that businesses recycle and report, the City gains \$15 to \$20 in recycling funding from the State. Special Events: Don't toss it out with the trash, bag your can for recycling and save cash!

City streets and special events are turning blue. Wondering why? Mayor Ravenstahl is continuing to promote blue recycling neighborhoods with increased opportunities for recycling on streets in the City's business and neighborhood districts. Walnut Street has recycling bottles; Southside and Downtown have recycling receptacles and more will be coming soon. Previous pilot programs are now turning into full programs as business district patrons can now toss their beverage cans into recycling receptacles rather than trash cans in some areas and at special events.

If you are hosting a fair, bazaar, social, picnic, performance, sporting or special event with an expected daily attendance of 200 or more persons, you are required to provide for the separation and collection of recycling materials. You are required to recycle bottles and cans, and corrugated cardboard from these events. Household trash

In addition to household refuse. crews will accept chairs, small TVs, bikes, small appliances, garden tools, end tables, ironing boards, roasters and grills.

Place all refuse at the designated site on collection day in plastic bags or bagged and placed into a container not exceeding 35 gallons in size.

Place needles, syringes and lancets in a hard plastic container with a tight-fitting plastic lid, labeled as medical waste.

Up to 5 bags of leaves will be collected curbside.

Wrap sharp objects (glass/metal) in heavy paper & place in a box sealed with tape or string. Place animal feces/litter in double plastic bag and place outside the refuse container.

Large items such as furniture, large appliances and discards from small renovation projects

Bulk items include sofas, recliner chairs, tables, box springs, mattresses, dressers, large TVs, stoves, washers, dryers, toilets, hot water tanks, windows, and fencing in bundles not exceeding 35 pounds or 5 feet in length.

Any excess material and other excessively large items above the two-item limit will NOT be collected unless special pickup arrangements are made in advance. A cost of \$100 for each half-hour applies to special pick-up. Call 412-255-2773.

Newspapers place in blue plastic bags or tie in bundles.
