Troubled Over Bridge

The engineers who assembled at the New Hazlett Theater on June 14th to explain the North Side bridge projects couldn't say exactly what the state is thinking. Thus many of the 150 attendees left feeling as if they'd just spent two hours conversing with the wrong people.

The plan is to replace a decaying, 107-year-old bridge on West Ohio Street with one that has three more feet of clearance for the railroad beneath it. The \$5 million project, which includes demolishing the nearby Ridge Avenue Bridge that has been shut down for years, would allow Norfolk Southern to run double-stack trains for the first time there. It's part of a national strategy to get more freight off congested highways. That makes sense as far as it goes. The trouble is, it can't go very far.

At the same time when the state Public Utility Commission (PUC) is requiring the city to raise this bridge to 22 feet, the PUC and the railroad have approved major repairs to the bridge at Brighton Road and North Avenue that keep it at 19 feet. That's too low for any double-stack train to get under. A handful of other North Side bridges just up the line also run interference at that level. North Siders were there largely out of concern for a bridge design that threatens two dozen stately trees lining West Ohio Street in historic Allegheny Commons Park. Recent assurances by the city that only three trees might be in trouble were quickly dialed back; Patrick Hassett, assistant city public works director, told the crowd that saving these "irreplaceable" trees is a priority but he couldn't promise anything.

The federal, state and city governments are splitting the \$5 million cost 80/15/5, which means the city's tab is \$250,000 and the state's \$750,000. Meantime, Norfolk Southern, which took the city to court to make sure the clearance is 22 feet, is on the hook for nothing. More than one person noted that the state PUC has mandated a bridge design, unwanted by the city or its residents, to appease a multibillion-dollar corporation at the same time when the federal, state and city governments are chronically short on funds.

All that might be easier to accept if we could see the grand scheme. We're told a multibillion-dollar expansion of the Panama Canal will bring increased traffic to the Port of Philadelphia and, in turn, eastern railroads. Norfolk Southern's main rival, CSX, will begin raising the roof on its tunnel in SouthSide Works later this year to accommodate double-stack trains there as early as 2013. Norfolk Southern, though, already gets double-stack lines through Pittsburgh by using its South Side line before crossing the Ohio River. That makes this North Side work seem more a want than a need.

I pressed Rudy Husband, the railroad spokesman, for a timetable on when double-stack trains are expected to go through the lower North Side. "The current issue is between the PUC and the city," Mr. Husband said in an e-mail. "Norfolk Southern has a larger role in the current situation would be inaccurate and irresponsible." As for the broader strategy, Mr. Husband didn't offer any timetable, saying, "NS fully endorses bridge projects that have minimum 22-foot clearances over our rights-of-way wherever and whenever the opportunities present themselves, which is consistent with state and national transportation policy."

Yet even those of us who consider that sound policy have trouble seeing the scenario where tall trains eventually get down this line. The bridge rehab was pushed instead of a more costly plan to lower the rail bed for roughly a half-mile, work that had been estimated at \$20 million to \$29 million.

John Canning, a North Side historian, was among those saying that such reasoning missed problems dead ahead. The Brighton-North intersection is already sloped in four directions to get over the railroad, and raising it more seems a non-starter. The PUC, which has exclusive jurisdiction over rail crossings, doesn't institute construction projects and acts only on applications. The city applied for bridge work on a route that Norfolk Southern has "to get double-stack trains through Pittsburgh," acting press secretary Denise McCracken said.

That's it, then. When and how taller trains might run through the North Side, either nobody knows or nobody's saying. Just because a bridge is built for greater clearance doesn't mean the reasoning must be clear.

Electric Supplier Shopping:

Powering Choice in Your Home

Summer is coming, and with that, higher electricity prices for some of us as fans and air conditioners begin to hum. You may have received pieces of mail from new companies on choosing an electricity supplier. I certainly have. It may be a prudent time of year to look into your options on electricity choice. Utility rates are governed by the Public Utility Commission. Over the last few years, established rate caps expired, allowing utility companies to petition the PUC to raise their rates based on their costs. Alternate suppliers were empowered to enter the market and give consumers more choices. The PUC has created PA Power Switch (http://www.papowerswitch.com/) as a guide for consumers to use in making informed choices. There are three parts to your electric service: generation, transmission and distribution. Generation is the production of electricity—the companies who produce it are called suppliers. Transmission is the movement of that electricity from where it is produced to a local distribution system. Distribution is the delivery of electricity to your home or business.

In most of my district in Pittsburgh city limits, Duquesne Light serves as your electric company. Duquesne will continue to deliver your service, provide maintenance, and handle your billing, but you are now able to choose the electric supplier who generates the electricity that you use. Once you enter your zip code, you can see all the available suppliers, their price to compare, and contractual terms. You are welcome to stay with Duquesne Light as supplier or you may elect to switch. A quick search for zip code 15201, home of my Lawrenceville district office, pulled up seven different options for residential properties. I urge you to visit PA Power Switch online or to call the PUC at 1-800-692-7380 and research carefully. Bill Barron:

Helping to Change the Face of Central Northside

For too many years, people passed by the corner of Federal and North with either a sad memory of what it used to be or a fragile hope for what it might become. Bill Barron, real estate developer who has played a significant role in the rebirth of Lawrenceville, saw opportunity and acted. As a result, the Central Northside now has a flourishing Crazy Mocha and will soon have a new deli right next door. And, a few doors up on Federal Street, Toula's is about to get a make-over and a new lease on life. Who needs HGTV when we have Bill Barron?

Bill is a no-nonsense guy with a pragmatic approach to community redevelopment. He buys mostly long-vacant buildings in communities in transition. The price, location and foot traffic have to be just right. And, the community needs to be cooperative. That's his formula for transformation. According to Bill, "I knew the corner of Federal and North was a good location because of the hospital, medical offices and the schools. The townhouses on Federal Street were underway and the library was there."

Finding the right business to breathe life into the building is another key factor. Bill had a good partner in Crazy Mocha, a tenant of his in Lawrenceville. "They don't mind going into transitional areas. They are local people," says Bill. "I knew I had a good tenant I could depend on; they knew they had a landlord they could depend on. Crazy Mocha opened up in January 2010 and business has been better than we had

The soon-to-open Deli on North also fits this mold. Deli on Butler found success in Lawrenceville as one of Bill's tenants. That relationship paved the way to open another storefront in one of Bill's buildings on the North Side.

Bill is a modest man and would shake off any reference to magician. But it's so tempting when you look at what he has created. For decades those two structures had been in disrepair. Bill's architectural vision of staying true to the original design of the building and creating something that fits in with the surrounding fabric of the neighborhood has transformed that small corner into something akin to hope.

He's the first to say that he didn't do it alone, however. With the help of CNNC's Tom Hardy and Kirk Burkley, Bill was able to acquire these two long-vacant properties from the URA. "Tom and Kirk have been great," says Bill. "They helped me in the acquisition of the Crazy Mocha building from the URA and Toula's through a sheriff's sale. And, they helped me maneuver through that landscape of the greater community."

Tom Hardy, CNNC Development Consultant, says this about Bill. "He's a guy who quietly gets things done. He has a way of grinding through the difficult and time consuming aspects of these projects and gets results. And, he doesn't care who gets the credit."

Renovating Toula's will be Bill's next project. It will remain a food operation with an apartment on the upper floor. His success on the corner of Federal and North provides a glimpse of the transformation about to take place. With vision, keen business sense and great relationships, Bill Barron is helping to bring new energy to the Central Northside. He serves as a role model to others.






Into the Woods

Temple University School of Medicine to Open Campus on the North Side

West Penn Allegheny Health System and the Temple University School of Medicine has announced plans to create a new four-year medical school on Pittsburgh's North Side. The health system already serves as a clinical campus for third- and fourth-year med students with the Temple University School of Medicine. With the expansion, the health system will be able to offer all four years of undergraduate medical education to students.

The classroom setting will be based in Four Allegheny Center and Allegheny General Hospital will provide clinical education. According to officials, 30 students will be accepted in the first class of the new medical school program, which is scheduled to start in 2013. Temple has been ranked among the top 50 medical schools in the nation for research.

COMMUNITY GEM:

Allegheny General Hospital...Committed to Community Partnership

The North Side has bragging rights to a world-class team right in its back yard. No, not the Steelers. This team is Allegheny General Hospital (AGH). AGH and the North Side go way back and have a long track record of working together for economic development and the welfare of local residents. The hospital at Cedar and North Avenues and the medical offices on Federal Street, both just an easy stroll away for most residents, is a community gem that scores on many fronts.

According to Barbara Talerico, CNNC Treasurer, "The Central Northside Neighborhood Council is fortunate to have ongoing support from a committed partner like AGH. With CNNC and AGH working together to create a safe, healthy and vibrant environment, everyone involved wins. As CNNC improves the neighborhood, AGH benefits, too. And, as AGH expands, that helps grow the Northside."

AGH was founded in 1885 when the area was known as Allegheny City. Over the decades it grew in stature figuratively and literally, with a building that signaled its growing world-class reputation. The "skyscraper" building was built in the 1920s and is still a signature of the AGH footprint on Central Northside.

During a time of expansion for AGH in the 1980s, the residents of the North Side requested a presence at the table to make sure that community impact was being considered. AGH agreed and developed a six-point plan to respond to the issues identified by residents. The first of its kind in the region, the agreement outlines six initiatives that guide partners in working together to realize their common goals for housing, education and employment, economic development and health of the communities.

The six initiatives are:

Neighborhood Re-Investment

AGH lends its support and technical assistance with projects that address the physical landscapes near the Hospital proper. These neighborhood projects include purchase and infill of vacant or blighted properties and façade and streetscape improvements. Improvements include the renovation of the Aeberlie building at the corner of North Avenue and Sandusky Street, and the Parkhurst Street Improvements.

Education Initiatives

AGH employees serve as mentors to Northside youth by providing job readiness training and hands-on experience in a real-life work setting. Other initiatives include the Stranger Danger Awareness program, the Allegheny Women's Biotechnology Workforce Collaborative which provides tuition and resources for North Side women interested in earning a degree in medical science, and other health career support for both North Side residents and current AGH employees.



Mortgage and Marketing

AGH sponsors neighborhood tours for hospital employees to visit cultural and neighborhood attractions on the North Side. The Partnership also promotes North Side neighborhood events through the use of its newsletters, communications, and displays. Homebuyer education is provided through the Workforce Home Benefit Program.

Health Improvement Initiatives

The North Side Health Improvement Partnership works to improve the overall health status and quality of life of North Side residents. Programming includes Access to Healthcare initiatives, the North Side Youth Summer Guide and the North Side STRIDE Walking Program.

Neighborhood Employment

AGH is committed to promoting the economic vitality of the North Side by providing priority to North Side residents in hiring for new positions, providing all other qualifications are equal.

Local Purchasing Initiatives

AGH purchases products and services from Northside businesses whenever possible. In addition, vendor fairs are held bi-annually for North Side merchants to showcase and sell their products at AGH.

Debra Caplan, Senior Vice President, Allegheny General Hospital, has been part of the growth and evolution of this partnership and sees real value in its accomplishments. Says Caplan, "I am truly proud of the dedication and commitment of all parties involved to make the North Side a vibrant and healthy community."

Keri Harmicar, Mexican War Streets resident, was hired by AGH as Partnership Coordinator and works out of the Northside Leadership Council office. She works closely with Caplan and serves as liaison to the Central Northside and other North Side communities.

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
