Looking Ahead...

2011 is off to an exciting start. The board of the Mexican War Streets Society met for the January 2011 Retreat, where we discussed the direction of the year ahead. We welcomed Kathy Deis as the Greenspace chair, Tim and Debbie Proctor as Membership chairs, and Zandrea Ambrose to the seat of Treasurer. We will have a strong focus on preservation, with the hope of making the dream of expanding the City Historic District a reality.

General Membership Meetings

Meetings will now be on Mondays and held quarterly. Dates will be published in the newsletter as well as delivered electronically. The first meeting will be held Monday, February 21st at the Allegheny Unitarian Universalist Church, 416 West North Ave, starting at 7:00 p.m. We encourage you to come to the meetings and bring a friend to become a new member.

Historic District Expansion

For many years there has been discussion about expanding the Historic District. I met with the Central North Side Neighborhood Council President and Vice President early in 2010, where we discussed many important issues, one of which was the possibility of expanding the Historic District. The MWSS then enlisted the services of Lisa Miles (author of the book *Resurrecting Allegheny City*) to do in-depth historic research to support the nomination of the proposed new Historic District. Along with his own in-depth research, Jim Lawrence compiled the information that Lisa Miles provided him. Jim gave months of his time to compile the nomination packet which is a spectacular assemblage of historic information. This nomination is focused on preserving and protecting the community from further destruction for generations to come.

Invention, Image and Investment: Crafting a Future that Matters

Last week while at a store in the East end of Pittsburgh, I ran into a familiar salesman and, as we got to talking, he told me he was thinking of moving out of his home on the Southside. Of course, I told him that he should move here, to the Central Northside. After an uncomfortable moment, he said that he used to live in the Mexican War Streets but didn't feel comfortable moving back because he feared the neighborhood is not safe. There are lots of things that could elicit a response like this, ranging from the constant evening news reports from "police headquarters on the Northside" to some audacious homicides in recent years, and years of visible blight may have played a role. But there's no doubt that the singular image of our neighborhood as a hotbed of crime discourages investment. We dismiss these kinds of responses at our own peril.

We need a new story for the Central Northside—a narrative that more fully expresses the great reasons to live, work or open a business in a diverse and increasingly thriving urban neighborhood so close to the city's political, financial and entertainment centers. According to an essay in the Spring 2000 issue of *Building Blocks*—a publication of the Fannie Mae Foundation—the process of "reimagining distressed communities" is a "potentially powerful tool to promote revitalization" and to attract investors into formerly distressed communities. Although the essay's authors are speaking primarily about reigniting financial investment. The ideas of investment and ownership are not simply financial matters; they are emotional matters as well. There is a reason we use the expression, "I'm invested in this relationship" or "You should take ownership of that problem." To be sure, you may have invested heavily in the neighborhood financially but, ultimately, this kind of financial investment, this kind of ownership is grounded in a belief that this is a place that is worth calling home, regardless of what one does or doesn't own.

You are invested in this neighborhood: You "own" its problems and its potential if you care about its image. No matter what financial investment each of us has, we share a common investment in the future of our community. So, when you read in this issue of *The New Allegheny Times* about the CNNC's efforts to re-imagine or re-brand our community for the benefit of residents and outside investor's alike, think twice before you dismiss it as "mere PR." The image of a community matters not only to outside investors but also to our future and to the degree that we can invest ourselves in a brighter future.

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Phase II of Federal Hill

Construction on Phase II of the three-phase, \$15 million Federal Hill housing development in the Central Northside is underway. The housing initiative is a collaboration between S & A Homes, The Central Northside Neighborhood Council (CNNC), and the URA, and this portion of the project will bring 19 townhouses to the once blighted intersection of Alpine and Federal Streets.

Between November 2009 and September 2010, the entirety of the 23 Phase I townhouses, located one block downhill from the Phase II site, were sold. Developer S & A Homes is working to have the second phase homes completed by Spring 2012. The houses will range in size between 1,400 to 2,300-square-feet and sell for between \$140,000 and \$299,000. All will offer at least three bedrooms and one-and-a-half bathrooms.

"Customers can put in options, they can individualize the property. They can choose the appliances they want, change walls, and change the flooring. They're not spec houses. The customer gets to customize them," says Andy Haines, vice president of S & A Homes.

The Federal Hill project began in 1994 when the URA and CNNC worked together to declare the area blighted in order to pave the way for major redevelopment. Indeed, since the completion of Phase I, Federal Street looks radically different.

"I get a lot of calls from people looking for older homes to restore in the area, so it's certainly spurred the housing market and continued the momentum of the neighborhood," says Tom Hardy, development consultant for the CNNC.

It's Election Time Again

How time flies, while thinking about what to write in this article we re-read the last few years of newsletter editions from around the same time. Things have definitely changed in this neighborhood since moving here in 2008. Some would believe for the better and some believe we still have much work to be done. We have made great strides in this neighborhood, with the new homes on Federal Street, a new Café Mocha, and work that will soon begin on the Garden Theater block. There are in fact still many things to do with implementing our community plan and you can be a part of this.

Being on the board is no easy task, it is definitely a working board, you have to be able to attend at least two meetings each month and many times that number will increase once you take on being a chair of a specific committee. You have to be willing to listen to all neighbors, not just the ones that voted for you! And sometimes the things you want to happen the most take the longest time. But the rewards and the satisfaction I have felt from serving on this Board are unlike any we have experienced.

We need your help in continuing the momentum of the things that have been happening, speaking for your community, protecting what is here and improve the quality of life for all our residents. Please contact our election committee if you would like more information or to suggest residents that you believe would be good candidates. You can do so via email: elections@cnnc-pgh.org or contact us directly at 412.586.5746. In accordance with the amended by-laws, each member shall be entitled to one vote and is eligible to become a candidate, provided he/she is:

[A] present at the meeting, [B] has attended at least one other regular membership or special membership meeting as a dues paid member within the last twelve months, [C] is a member listed in the membership list on the record date as established in the By-Laws and [D] is current with dues.

Also in accordance with the amended by-laws, a member is now defined as any person, at least eighteen years old, who is current with membership dues and resides in the Central Northside Neighborhood. An individual member is eligible to cast one and only one vote or ballot per CNNC decision or election. Group members are not eligible to vote in council business, including the Board of Directors elections. Nominations will be open now through the April meeting.

Although the board makes no endorsements of particular candidates, we think it is important that the person elected adds to the board in terms of unique skills sets, life experiences or social/cultural identity. The current board possesses a wide variety of life experiences and skill sets in areas like law, politics, business, real estate, insurance, finance, education, healthcare, human resources, travel and tourism and communications. This high level of skill has allowed to Board to function productively without the expense of a full time staff.

The current board varies somewhat by sex/gender, income level, age, sexual orientation, martial status, national origin, religious identification or practice, educational attainment, political affiliation, home ownership and other factors representative of the diversity in our neighborhood. Even so, we recognize a lack of representation on the board by persons of African descent. Given the current demographics of our neighborhood, the under-representation of African-Americans on the board concerns us greatly and we strongly encourage members to identify, nominate and help elect qualified neighbors who might help us fill this position in a way that benefits the board and the whole neighborhood.

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Pledge Now! Northeast Common Challenge Grant



The Allegheny Commons Initiative seeks the support of the Northside community as the second phase of park restoration begins. The \$2.2 million Northeast Common project will be undertaken in phases, beginning with the area along Cedar Avenue between East Ohio and Tripoli Streets. The project will restore paths, plant trees, add lighting and pedestrian amenities. To better accommodate the Farmers' Market, the lawns will be reinforced and electrical access provided.

The restoration of the historic Northeast Fountain and the promenade along North Avenue to Federal Street is next up. To support that project, the Colcom Foundation has issued a challenge grant – for every dollar pledged, they will contribute another dollar, up to \$100,000. As an example, the Mexican War Streets Society's 2011 contribution of \$5,000 will leverage \$5,000 more from the Colcom Foundation.

CNNC Development Committee Leads the Way

By late spring, a project for an additional 46 new and rehab housing will be built North of Samponia Way. Several units adjacent to Federal Hill will be built by S&A while the majority of the project was awarded to local firm October Development. That component will be managed by the CNNC.


The new CNNC has now formalized its "Conservatorship"—a program wherein a wholly owned subsidiary of the CNNC will seek legal control over blighted and abandoned properties, locate developers and create new and affordable housing in the neighborhood.

The exclusive negotiating period between the URA and the development group led by Wayne Zukin has been extended so that tenants for the Garden block can be firmed up before construction begins.

No Vacancy: **Reviving an Empty Deutschtown Lot**

The Children's Museum of Pittsburgh and Team Laminates are reviewing design proposals to transform an empty Deutschtown lot into a public art installation and garden beds that will provide vegetables to the community.

The project began in December when Team Laminates approached The Children's Museum about joining forces to beautify the 1,200square-foot lot outside their building at the corner of Spring Garden Avenue and Vinial Street. The Children's Museum suggested the project might benefit from community input in the form of a design competition. Children's Museum youth programs coordinator Kimberly Bracken is working with Team Laminates, The Historic Deutschtown Development Corporation, and the community on the project.

"From the beginning the museum has said two things," says Chris Siefert, deputy director of The Children's Museum. "One is that if we want to do art and also design these garden beds we should try and make it as cohesive as possible. The second thing is that we're all committing to something that's going to have near and longer term implications. We're not just going to build something and walk away from it."

With grants from Alcoa and The National Endowment for the Arts, the winning proposal writer will be awarded \$5,000 for the project and will also receive donated supplies from Deutschtown's Team Laminates, Cully Glass Corp, and Artcraft Wood Products.

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Brady Communications Recommended To Help Central Northside's Image

Big changes are on the horizon for how the Central Northside presents itself. Building on the collaborative Community Plan effort of 2009, CNNC began a journey in August 2010, to examine the Central Northside's brand (including logo and colors, community name and reputation) and determine what, if any, changes were necessary. An ad hoc committee of Board members was formed to work with CNNC Communication Consultant, Karen Bryant on issuing a request for proposals (RFP) aimed at finding a PR/Communications firm to help in this effort.

As initial research moved forward, largely with community-based focus groups (see "Focus Groups," page 9), it was clear that the current "brand identity" (what people think about the neighborhood) does not accurately reflect who we are today as a community and where we plan to go in the future. It became obvious - it's time to consider a makeover.

In response to the RFP, three proposals were submitted representing very different approaches to rethinking and remaking our community's image. The committee conducted site visits to gain a thorough understanding of how each agency proposed to create a new brand identity for the Central Northside.

The committee's findings were unanimous. At the February Board of Director's meeting, the committee will recommend to the full board that CNNC pursue hiring Pittsburgh-based Brady Communications be approved to bring a strategic approach to rebranding the community and CNNC. It will then go to the CNNC membership for approval at March's monthly meeting.

The committee selected Brady Communications for having a full spectrum of capabilities, in-depth experience in community rebranding, direct experience with some of North Side's gems like the Children's Museum and the Carnegie Science Center and a well articulated passion for working with CNNC to effect positive change.

Stay tuned -as we begin the rebranding process, CNNC will engage the entire Central Northside community for input. A shared vision and commitment to action will be necessary to meet our vision to "... transform all our neighborhood's vacant lots and empty storefronts by filling them with thriving individuals, commerce and families of all kinds."

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Space for Change

For its new Literary Center project, City of Asylum/Pittsburgh was a winner in the national "Space for Change" Competition. The award is accompanied by \$50,000 and two years of technical support.

City of Asylum/Pittsburgh was begun in October of 2004 and is the publisher of Sampsonia Way. The organization is best known for its exiled-writer residency program and its "house publications" on the facades of the houses where the writers live. However, it also sponsors an annual Jazz-Poetry Concert and salon-style readings by authors from around the world as well as readings on the streets and gardens of the



Central Northside and residencies for visiting international writers and translators.

What started out as a program with a limited mission has become a catalyst for the transformation of its Northside neighborhood, rooted in making reading and writing a part of everyday life. The literary center on Monterey Street will convert a former bar, a vacant lot, and an abandoned home into a unified space with a bookstore (specializing in translations), a bar-café-restaurant, and spaces for readings and writing workshops. The project will enable a major expansion of City of Asylum/ Pittsburgh's literary program and residencies and is intended to be a home for literary activity in Pittsburgh.

Local foundation support has been critical to launching the project. Over \$1.5 million has been committed by the Richard King Mellon Foundation, The Heinz Endowments, and the Hillman Foundation, with additional support expected over the next few months. Ground-breaking is projected for this coming summer.

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It's Humane to Volunteer

When I came across the listing for an available internship at the Western PA Humane Society, I knew immediately that I wanted to go. Helping animals was something I always wanted to do and it offered a chance to combine volunteer service with work experience. If you're going to college, it doesn't leave behind a lot of money to give to charity. Nonprofits like the Western PA Humane Society depend on the time volunteers offer every bit as much as they depend on the money that donors contribute.

Working at the WPA Humane Society has been an eyeopening experience. It's not as simple as picking up a homeless animal off the street, sticking it in a cage and then waiting for someone to take it home. It takes a lot of time and effort to get pets ready for adoption. The more human contact an animal receives, the friendlier it becomes and the more likely it is to be adopted. Helping an animal get adopted can involve something as simple as walking a dog once a week or cuddling a cat, to something as committed as taking a litter of kittens or puppies home for a few weeks of foster care. The Humane Society offers opportunities for every level of commitment. The rewards for volunteering are also tangible and immediate -- the creatures you're helping directly might not be able to say thank you, but it's extremely satisfying to hear that somebody is taking home your favorite walk buddy or that adorable cat you cuddled.

Every time I leave my internship, I feel like I've done something to help out a great cause. The next time you're sitting around watching TV and wondering what to do, consider stopping by the shelter and seeing how you can make a difference in the life of a homeless animal. I promise you will not regret it.





We talked to a wide spectrum of residents reflecting key target segments: retirees; gays and lesbians; young professionals; African American professionals; artists; and, young families with children. Their many insights will be shared with the advertising agency selected to conduct the rebranding campaign.

Out of the diversity of voices, several consistent themes emerged that set this community apart from all others in the city:

- People are the community: Whether we're seen as quirky, urban pioneers, cultural creatives, blue collar or young professionals one thing unifies us we care for each other in a way reminiscent of times gone-by.
- We celebrate diversity: There is a sincere celebration of diversity in the people who reside here and their ideas, professions, talents, lifestyles, ages, races, sexual orientation and education.
- You can get there from here! No other neighborhood has such walkable access to downtown, cultural venues and sporting venues and easy driving access to the airport and other parts of the city.
- History is all around: The architecture and the history of the area converge to create a compelling and meaningful foundation for community.
- Get "stoopified!" Prospective residents might have to navigate negative perceptions of the North Side from friends and family, but once they step into the neighborhood, they will be surprised and converted. Whether they encounter folk on the stoops or at the Monterey Pub or view amazing homes at the MWS House Tour – the key to changing their perception is getting them here – boots on the ground.

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


A Message from City Council

As we prepare ourselves to embrace the much awaited coming of Spring, I want to take this opportunity to thank you for the faith that you have placed in me to be your City Councilman. I spent my first year in office learning the innermost workings of City government, meeting organizations from the various neighborhoods that comprise District 6 and the residents whom I represent. A principal concern that was consistently brought to my attention from various individuals and organizations in the Northside was the issue of preservation. We need an active residency to work in conjunction with our office and make us aware of problem areas that need to be addressed.

We also need your help in locating potholes in need of repair. The Public Works Department is launching a City-wide effort to fix streets in disrepair. Residents can report areas of concern at www.pittsburghpothole.com, via the 311 line, or by contacting the District 6 Council Office directly at 412-255-2134. Non-residents can contact 412-255-CITY. Complaints should include street addresses, intersections and landmarks to ensure workers get to the right places. Once received, the City will attempt to address complaints within three to five days. With information provided by residents such as you, City government services will most efficiently respond to problems in your community. We hope that you will join us in this joint effort.
