

This has been a year that brings together our vision and efforts. And what is emerging is a new sense of who we are as a community and a clear vision of who we are becoming.








Since our founding in 1970 we shifted from being primarily a community benefits organization to one whose focus is primarily community development. The current ACCA board is comprised of 13 committed neighborhood volunteers with backgrounds that include banking, small business, information technology, strategic development and planning, and engineering. We also have two paid part-time consultants who focus on communications and real-estate development. Our financials are strong. Our board represents stability, and is committed to inclusiveness, and good governance. Our recent accomplishments exemplify a key organizational strength: we work well with partners.

In 2009, we changed our vision statement to read: "By the end of 2015, ACCA will transform all of our neighborhood's vacant lots and empty storefronts by filling them with thriving individuals, commerce and families of all kinds."

That same year, we identified during the community master planning process with Pfaffmann + Associates, that, among other things, image and lack of brand identity are a barrier to our desired neighborhood repopulation.

Safety

Achieving a safer neighborhood is a goal in every neighborhood. In Allegheny City Central, our residents take responsibility in meeting that goal. Whether it is hosting National Night Out for the entire community to form tighter bonds, installing security cameras in known trouble spots, working with the police, or hosting safety walks and safety "stoop" gatherings, ACC residents and the ACCA Safety Committee are having a positive impact on the neighborhood.

Community Engagement

Every community benefits when residents are engaged. But achieving that is often a challenge. ACCA found the answer – provide real opportunities for residents to be involved in matters that impact their quality of life, keep lines of communication flowing, and be transparent in decision making. The results -Allegheny City Central residents came out in force to participate in multiple meetings for the community master planning process, in focus groups and a vision survey to help steer the branding process, to serve on the ACCA Board of Directors to guide business decisions, point the way for development and attain fiscal responsibility, and to build a new playground with KaBOOM!



Welcoming Neighborhood


Allegheny City Central is a welcoming community. To help orient newcomers, in May 2012 ACCA launched Welcome, Neighbor to Neighbor. In this program, neighborhood ambassadors greet new residents, give them an overview of life in Allegheny City Central, and supply them with materials donated by local businesses and cultural organizations. 


Plant a seed. Provide sunlight and water. Pull weeds.

It also describes our fiscal vision.



As we continue to strengthen our financial position, our goal is to continue the trend of having more of our income come from developer fees and less from grants. We have broadened our income sources by offering products for sale like Allegheny City flags, and participating in The Pittsburgh Foundation's annual Day of Giving.

Funds will continue to be spent on acquiring and installing security cameras in targeted locations, as well as purchasing blighted and tax delinquent properties to redevelop and return to the tax rolls.
